meaningful youth participation, YOURS ensures that young people are not only heard but also active contributors in designing and implementing road safety policies.

In 2023, YOURS has embraced an exploratory approach by incorporating themes such as sustainable mobility into its core mission. This strategic expansion acknowledges that road safety cannot be isolated from other crucial issues like climate action and social equity. The tangible contributions of youth in these efforts cannot be overstated. Their work advocating for safer streets, influencing policy changes, and raising awareness to shape a mobility system where road safety is a given, not an aspiration.

As we look ahead, the need for sustained investment in youth leadership and engagement is clear. YOURS remains committed to supporting and amplifying youth efforts, ensuring their voices are integral to the ongoing dialogue and action on road safety and sustainable mobility.

I look forward to continuing to work with Adnan and Shanthi on the Supervisory Board and helping YOURS in making an impact on road safety while broadening the focus in a balanced and impactful way. Additionally, I look forward to welcoming new board members in the coming year to increase the board's diversity in age and origin.

### **FOREWORD**

Road Safety work is hard, complex, and ever-evolving. Still, there are common threads that underpin lasting progress, and that is what YOURS experienced during 2023.



ast year marked significant changes for the organisation. We experienced a leadership transition, saying goodbye to Floor Lieshout, the founder of YOURS. This brought a moment of self-reflection and an opportunity to revisit our identity. We fine-tuned our work to ensure a bigger impact in reducing road traffic crashes and injuries.

On the other hand, 2023 was the year when we truly started seeing more onsite traction after the COVID-19 pandemic through the support, development, and leadership of tangible and effective in-country youth advocacy for meaningful youth participation and upskilling youth across all aspects of our programming.

The pinnacle was hosting the first-ever Youth Leadership Retreat in Madrid, where nearly 30 young leaders from different countries met to continue strengthening their skills to influence policy change. This group supported expanding the youth and road safety movement globally. In 2023, we also concluded an in-country programme that is close to our hearts, the Belize Youth Empowerment Programme on Road Safety, where government officials and youth leaders acquired the necessary skills to improve road safety across the country, not only by creating awareness but also by assessing and designing better infrastructure around schools.

While YOURS continues to grow and deepen its impact on the ground, 2023 was a crucial year to hear youth demands on meaningful youth participation in road safety decision-making through the #ClaimingOurSpace campaign. We also witnessed the results from the 2023 Global Status Report. Those

two inputs will guide our advocacy priorities in 2024 towards increasing investment, fostering multi-sectoral collaboration and demanding government accountability in the lead-up to the 3rd World Youth Assembly for Road Safety, happening in 2025 as an official side event of the 4th Ministerial Conference on Road Safety.

I have been incredibly impressed by the hard work put in by the people who make YOURS—our team members, Supervisory Board, financial and local partners and most importantly, the young leaders. Thank you for standing by our side. We are humbled to do this work alongside you. With your support, we will lay the groundwork for the YOURS we want and need to be; an organisation supporting youth worldwide to play a leading role in designing the transportation systems they will inherit. We are driven by a belief that youth have the practical skills, the lived experiences and the innovative ideas to bring effective long-lasting results to adress this global public health crisis.

### ROAD SAFETY FATALITIES THE BIGGEST THREAT TO YOUTH LIVES

Road traffic crashes are the biggest killer of youth aged 15-29 years old, with an estimated 1,000 dying every day on the world's roads. If we include children aged 5 to 14, the number increases significantly, contributing to the over 3,200 fatalities occurring daily. Additionally, road traffic crashes result in 20 to 50 million injuries per year<sup>1</sup>.

oad traffic crashes impact youth during their most productive years, with approximately 66% of fatalities occurring among youth and adolescents. Globally, 32.7% of deaths in young people aged 10-24 years in 2019 were a result of transport injuries, unintentional injuries, or interpersonal violence and conflict.

1,000 YOUTH AGED 15-29 DIE EVERY DAY ON THE WORLD'S ROADS. "One of the biggest challenges I face is working with the government. Many government officials do not want to work with me because they feel I may be trying to take their job. Some also feel that our time hasn't reached [this level]. The second problem I face about road safety in Nigeria is capacity development. Before now, we didn't have access to capacity development; all we had was the research we'd been able to do. The third challenge is global exposure; we don't have access to the global platform to learn from best practices and gain resource materials." - Youth leader, Nigeria.



Despite being one of the most affected demographics in the community and the largest population under 25 in human history, 1.8 billion young people, youth are often underrepresented in decision-making processes. Based on the crowd-sourcing platform of the Global Partnership on Youth in the Post-2015 Development Agenda, two out of three countries

do not consult youth in the preparation of national development plans and, while youth aged between 20 and 39 years old represent 34% of the voting age population, only 23% of all parliament members are under 40 years old.

Youth have inherited unsafe and unsustainable mobility systems worldwide. Globally, young people struggle with these transportation systems, which traditionally exclude their voices in design.

"The issues for Uganda are non-helmet wearing for most motorists and poor response to the traffic law on speed limits. Then, deliberate exclusion of young people from road safety decision-making in every aspect of road safety. Not forgetting street harassment and violence against girls and women." - Youth Leader, Uganda.

While the situation is overwhelming, the youth are not helpless. They know which cost-effective solutions work to reduce road crash risks and how road safety solutions are more effective while connecting it with the broader development agenda. These measures are included in the series of policy briefs on SDGs and Road Safety (YOURS, 2021-2023), such as:



SDG4: Implementation of "School Streets" during pick-up and drop-off times to close school zones to cars enhances safety for walking and cycling while improving air quality for children and adolescents.

SDG5: Addressing the lack of consideration for women and girls' needs in transport policy is crucial to reducing their costs, stress, fear, and time poverty associated with inaccessible mobility systems.

**SDG10:** Adoption of 30 km/hr and 20 km/hr speed limits significantly reduces road traffic crashes, injuries, and deaths, especially for vulnerable road users.

**SDG10:** Multimodal transport systems catering to diverse needs and preferences contribute to reducing transport inequalities and social exclusion, particularly among younger generations.

**SDG13:** Incentivising active transit options, discouraging high-emission travel, and prioritising climate-resilient/ sustainable transit designs drives a paradigm shift in transportation.

**ROAD SAFETY** ACCELERATES REACHING THE GLOBAL TARGETS IN THE SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT AGENDA

There is evidence that road safety accelerates reaching the targets in the sustainable Development Agenda and YOURS upholds the global agenda as a cross-cutting theme across all programs and initiatives. We are proud to work with and for young people to develop global advocacy tools with effective measures and recommendations to influence decision-making processes across Health, Climate, Youth and Active Mobility agendas and support policy changes at local levels. However, it is crucial that youth voices, ideas and experiences are meaningfully incorporated into decision-making processes.

### **MEANINGFUL YOUTH PARTICIPATION:**

### AN EFFECTIVE SOLUTION TO THE ROAD SAFETY CRISIS

eaningful youth participation across policy design and implementation is rarely standard practice and often ineffective when available. It is clear that despite efforts to mainstream meaningful youth participation, it is often ad-hoc at best and lacks investment and political will. At its worst, governments do not view meaningful youth participation as a relevant or necessary part of policymaking.

Meaningful youth participation is key to solving this disconnect between young people and policymakers; it is crucial to develop effective policies that reflect the specific needs of youth and address major challenges such as road traffic injury. It is also important to repair the trust between governments and the youth and to build a more cohesive and fairer society. Meaningful youth participation requires using the appropriate tools and mechanisms to guarantee that young people's specific needs, views, and skills are recognised, valued, and woven into the very fabric of society and how it functions.

Meaningful youth participation requires a shift in mindset that challenges current perceptions of youth and bias that undermines their contributions to the policymaking process. It requires changing ways of working so that multiple mechanisms and approaches ensure all youth can influence policy, not just those with the time and resources to participate. Acting upon young people's perspectives, ideas, and contributions requires commitment and funding.

Meaningful youth participation in road safety is a matter of

vision. There is an urgent need to invest in youth leadership to prepare today's adolescents to become engaged citizens of tomorrow. They have the crucial role of adopting road safety as a fundamental pillar of societal core values, embedding safety into their countries set of principles and ensuring long-lasting effectiveness in their transportation systems.

Their experiences, voices, and needs are vital in shaping the world they will inherit. If their lived experiences, creative skills, and innovation abilities are honed through education and structural support, the benefits of safe and sustainable transport systems are limitless.

### WE WALK THE TALK

Youth for Road Safety (YOURS) plays a vital role in preventing road traffic injuries by working with and for young people to demand and deliver road safety and sustainable mobility.

YOURS organises a growing worldwide network of dynamic youth leaders passionate about road safety and sustainable mobility. It has an increasing list of partners, donors, and supporters that elevate the youth agenda and foster meaningful youth participation as a powerful facilitator for development and sustainability.

Recognised as a leader in supporting investment in youth, YOURS contributes to implementing the Global Plan for the Decade of Action for Road Safety 2021-2030,

in which youth are recognised as key stakeholders and achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The organisation is guided by strategic priorities that intersect to break out of the "transportation silo" of traditional road safety programmes and solidify connections to the sustainable development agenda. YOURS' strategic priorities implement best practices in transport planning and policy, encompassing:





#### **ADVOCACY**

YOURS promotes meaningful youth participation and leadership at all levels, from the highest global decision-making bodies to city/ community policy discussions. It leads global calls to put road safety higher on the political agenda by catalysing investment, awareness, and action to create safe and sustainable mobility systems that protect youth.



#### CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT

YOURS equips the leaders of today and tomorrow to unlock their full potential as advocates for road safety and educates decision-makers about meaningful youth participation. YOURS has been an industry leader in youth-friendly, highly interactive training methodologies since its founding. This strategy has resulted in the creation of the **YOURS Academy** - the definitive online e-learning road safety school where youth and other stakeholders can learn about the global road safety crisis. Additionally, YOURS offers in-person training sessions that are engaging, dynamic, and fun, providing a friendly and interactive environment to ensure effective learning and empowerment for young people.



#### YOUTH MOVEMENT

YOURS energises the global youth movement for road safety to create a synergetic, youth-led force that demands and delivers road safety and sustainable mobility worldwide and in local communities. YOURS created the **Global Youth Coalition for Road Safety**, a member-based support structure of passionate young leaders taking action on safer mobility and meaningful youth participation to support this. We catalyse opportunities for young people to innovate new ideas, lead in-country initiatives, and learn from the global community's best practices.

### **ADVOCACY**

### STOP BLAMING US, START ENGAGING US

In 2023, YOURS facilitated meaningful youth engagement across **high-level global events,** providing a platform for young voices to self-advocate directly to policymakers and global partners on the importance of including their voices and perspectives in the design of transportation systems they are using and will inherit.

hese events encouraged decision-makers to incorporate youth perspectives into national policies addressing health, climate, gender, inequalities and other SDGs that clearly correlate with road safety. Through their participation, members of the Global Youth Coalition presented their grassroots initiatives, delivered impactful speeches, and fostered connections with peers and influential leaders.

YOURS delegates participated in and attended events like the SDG Summit, the 1.8 Billion Campaign, and the Conference of Parties (COP28), where they engaged in different bilateral meetings. The overarching objective was to underscore the critical importance of prioritising road safety within the sustainable development agenda, particularly as a significant concern for the global youth demographic under 29.


Besides high-level events, YOURS developed advocacy tools to better respond to local needs, demands, and nuances regarding road safety. The 2 Policy Briefs on Road Safety and the SDGs produced in 2023 highlighted the importance of addressing road safety issues to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals 10 and 11 in the 2030 Agenda while presenting a road map on how youth can influence policy by engaging with decision-makers.

Another milestone for young leaders is that YOURS delegates were given seats in decision-making and influential bodies such as the WHO Youth Council, the EU Youth Sounding Board, and the EU Youth Dialogue Platform. Each body amplifies the voices and experiences of young people and leverages their expertise, energy, and ideas to promote public health globally.

With an average monthly reach of over 15,000 users across different social media channels, YOURS members participated and organised various virtual public engagement actions to commemorate international days related to gender, climate action, and meaningful youth participation. Virtual events became strategic ways to foster discussions between youth leaders and other stakeholders from other sectors on the correlation between road safety and other sustainable development goals and how safety is a cross-cutting solution to achieve common goals and targets.





### **CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT IN NUMBERS:**

### LEVELLING UP ROAD SAFETY KOWLEDGE

In 2023, YOURS led activities that included online interactive capacity development sessions, the launch of new self-paced YOURS Academy platform modules, the training of trainers programme for young mobility activists in Belize, and uniting youth leadership team members for onsite training and interactive strategy sessions.



OURS led several online capacity development sessions with over 224 global participants across all 4 sessions. Each session addressed different knowledge demands of young people, which were identified through needs assessment initiatives. The 2023 sessions focused on project management, advocacy and meaningful youth participation.

In the spirit of levelling up the road safety knowledge of youth worldwide, the YOURS Academy has launched new modules for meaningful youth participation and advocacy. Each module was crafted to be informative, creative, and dynamic, featuring the voices of young leaders and global experts.

2023 also saw the continuation and conclusion of the **Belize Youth Empowerment Programme,** funded by the Caribbean Development Bank (CDB) and the Government of Belize. The project's goal was to educate and mobilise a group of young people in the country across 24 months to create engagement and awareness amongst their peers.

A new initiative in the Road Safety Project for 2023 included mapping and improving infrastructure around an unsafe school zone. In partnership with AMEND, YOURS organised a training to educate local authorities and stakeholders on the School Area Road Safety Assessment and Improvements (SARSAI) Methodology.

Following the Infrastructure training, the facilitators and local partners identified a pilot site in the Buttonwood Bay Nazarene Primary School to implement the SARSAI Methodology.

YOURS proudly states, "Nothing about youth without youth." That is why young people are at the core of everything YOURS do. These youth leaders have become a united youth voice globally and an empowered and action-oriented community at the local level.

In 2023, a growing number of young people joined the global youth movement for road safety through the Global Youth Coalition for Road Safety, reaching more than 2,000 youth from +70 countries who are actively engaged to take road safety higher in the sustainable development agenda.

This is achieved through a robust, long-term, vibrant support structure that provides youth opportunities, guidance, and tools to fulfil their commitments to the cause. The Youth Coalition inspires, mobilises and unites individual youth and organisations in an informal member-based structure guided by fundamental principles of meaningful youth participation and sustainable mobility. The Youth Coalition is YOURS contribution to meaningful youth participation in action.

In 2023, through the Youth Coalition, YOURS developed the membership journey, a process that tracks young people's entire experience within the Global Youth Coalition for Road Safety, to ensure we can maximise their experience and bring the right opportunities so they can contribute tangibly to road safety. It includes every interaction from initial touchpoints to the eventual exit from the movement.

The Youth Coalition also has different structures intricately linked to the Membership Journey, representing an essential part of the member's pathway. In 2023, these structures played a crucial role in mobilising the global road safety community while focusing on regional realities and other interconnected issues, by taking influential roles and responsibilities at the backoffice and high-level spaces.

The SDG Champions are in charge of upholding the road safety agenda in connection with the other Sustainable Development Goals: Good Health and Well-Being (SDG 3), Quality Education (SDG 4), Gender Equality (SDG 5), Reduced Inequalities (SDG 10), Sustainable Cities and Communities (SDG 11), and Climate Action (SDG 13).

### **LOCAL ACTIONS**

From the Global Youth Coalition springs another milestone: The Local Actions. 2023 is the initiative's third year, which grants young leaders resources and funding to implement a short-term or mid-term project to address the most pressing road safety issues in their communities.

In 2023, the Youth Coalition supported 14 Local Actions and invested 70,000 € in youth-led grassroots action projects oriented to address their community's most pressing road safety issues. 

### #CLAIMINGOURSPACE

Through the Youth Coalition, YOURS launched the #ClaimingOurSpace Campaign —a virtual campaign that captured the voices of young people in road safety to continue demanding meaningful youth participation in decision-making. It highlighted why youth must be meaningfully engaged in road safety and sustainable mobility to address their #1 killer.

The 2023 online campaign, with the theme "The Way We...", was organised with the support of UNICEF. We developed and launched a Global Youth Consultation, inviting young people to express how they currently navigate the world's roads and cities, including their aspirations for change.

All gathered inputs will be incorporated into the 2025 Youth Declaration, a crucial document that will bring youth voices to the 4th Ministerial Conference on Road Safety in Morocco in February 2025.




### THE INTANGIBLE IMPACT OF YOURS IN YOUTH LIVES

When measuring change, capturing and communicating what an activity or project has meant to the target audience is not always easy. While project key performance indicators give us a sense of what works, evaluating how YOURS' programs support a young person's long-term leadership development requires qualitative, unconventional methods.

aunched in 2022, the Youth Storytelling
Project asks young people to speak firsthand about their efforts as young road
safety advocates and expand on the Youth
Coalition's role in supporting these efforts.
The unique monitoring and evaluation project
combines focus groups and video testimonials
collected regularly over a two-year period to
observe individual-level personal development.

Ten Youth Coalition members -- newly joined and longstanding alike -- were asked to capture the unintended and non-visible learnings and outcomes from their experience as Youth Coalition members.

The two-year research project will conclude in August 2024, but so far, it has helped YOURS understand the intangible impact of its programmes and activities on young people's lives. The outcomes of the Youth Storytelling Project show that young leaders felt a "strong sense of community" within the Youth Coalition and see a "dynamic representation of youth" that gives them the experience and exposure to voice their opinions and ideas and also improves their sense of responsibility and confidence to be the solution.





"We have a voice. I know our voice is really important [and we need to keep] reminding young people that we have power. We are a big group, and we're not going to be shy when we meet with a public authority." - Female, Youth Coalition member.

### **GLOBAL CHANGEMAKERS FOR ROAD SAFETY**


In 2023, for the first time ever, YOURS brought together 23 exceptional young leaders from 18 countries, representing all sectors of society, to participate in a retreat to build on their outstanding leadership qualities and local community influence. The 4-day intensive training maximised participants' leadership and practical advocacy skills to demand and deliver road safety and sustainable mobility both globally and locally.

he retreat, supported by Fundación MAPFRE, hosted the training in Madrid and counted on the financial support of YOURS' long-term partners, TotalEnergies Foundation and MICHELIN Corporate Foundation.

This retreat was transformative for the participants and significantly contributed to their understanding, dedication, and passion for creating safer roads and sustainable communities globally. The legacy of this retreat will be seen through the initiatives, projects, and innovations YOURS has incorporated in the 2024 planning, as these young leaders have supported reprioritising the organisational focus.

The Retreat had nine training topics, which included an overview of leadership, team building, and the creation of cohesive groups, an in-depth take on leadership, a masterclass from a youth and road safety expert, advocacy skills, public speaking and presentations, meaningful youth participation, engaging and mobilising the community, and creating an action plan for the Youth Coalition.










### **FINANCE**







#### Upcoming 2024 Milestones

Safety (February 2025, Morocco)
YOURS has been entrusted to organise the 2025 World Youth Assembly for Road Safety in Marrakech, Morrocco, under the framework of the 4th Ministerial Conference on Road Safety.

Expecting to unite 200+ youth leaders worldwide, the Youth Assembly seeks to galvanise young leaders and continue fostering their leadership so that they can move from passive statistics into dynamic agents of change in designing the transportation systems they will inherit.

The Assembly takes a 'Glocal Approach' to ignite momentum across all strategic pillars in service of tomorrow's leaders. Delegates will engage in advocacy bilateral meetings and declarations, demonstrate capacity training through practical application, compete for innovation project seed funding, and participate in tech/AI, artistic, and global campaign activations.

YOURS Advocacy and Campaigns Toolkit

In 2024, YOURS will release the **Advocacy** and Campaigns Toolkit - a practical hands-on guide to enhance the advocacy skills of young

leaders, demonstrate new knowledge, and support them in understanding how to gain public support and mobilise communities. This tool will support building momentum for young leaders and encourage them to demand tangible commitments on investment and meaningful youth participation to their local governments in the lead-up to the 3rd World Youth Assembly for Road Safety and the 4th Ministerial Conference on Road Safety.

### YOURS Policy Brief on Road Safety and Health

In 2024, YOURS will conclude its series of policy briefs on Road Safety and the relevant SDGs by releasing the final publication on Road Safety and SDG 3, titled "Safe Streets, Healthy Lives: Advocating for Road Safety and Well-Being". This policy brief will highlight how designing a safer road environment can effectively tackle various health issues linked to road traffic injuries, air pollution, noise pollution, carbon emissions, and physical inactivity.
