Foreword Supervisory Board

On behalf of the YOURS Supervisory Board, it is my pleasure to reflect on a year that marked a pivotal change for our organisation. 2025 was a year of strategic clarity - youth leadership in mobility is increasingly recognised as indispensable, and YOURS is stepping up as a trusted partner, connecting country-level work with global actions. YOURS is truly a bridge, with one end rooted in local communities and the other end leading conversations worldwide - to show how young people lead the push for a safer and more sustainable transport.

The events of this past year also made it clear that we still have more work ahead of us. Unsafe mobility still places a massive burden on young people, and progress toward safer transport is uneven across the globe. The 3rd World Youth Assembly for Road Safety, organised in Morocco under the framework of the 4th Ministerial Conference on Road Safety was a powerful moment of accountability and a proud moment for YOURS. Youth stood before ministers and UN leaders to demand faster action, reminding them that commitments must translate into measurable improvements in safety and sustainability. It was both a celebration of youth agency and a sober reminder of the distance still to be covered.

Strategically, YOURS advanced its three core priorities in 2025: advocacy, capacity development, and youth mobilisation. Through advocacy, young leaders influenced decision-makers at global and national platforms, securing commitments to invest in evidence-based solutions. Capacity development reached thousands of learners worldwide, equipping

them with the skills to translate knowledge into local action. Meanwhile, youth mobilisation grew into a sustained global movement, with the Global Youth Coalition expanding to over 3,000 members and new alumni networks ensuring continuity of leadership. These achievements demonstrate how YOURS is building both the infrastructure and the momentum for long-term change.

YOURS continued to mature over 2025. Our programmes catalysed more investment, raised awareness, and equipped young leaders to step into decision-making spaces. Despite this progress, the need for greater investment in youth engagement remains urgent. As we enter the final five years of the Second Decade of Action for Road Safety, integrating youth vision meaningfully into global and local strategies will be crucial to achieving lasting change.

Looking ahead, it is clear that the momentum generated by youth voices, partnerships, and evidence-based action must be sustained and scaled. On behalf of the Supervisory Board, I extend gratitude to all who stood with YOURS this year, and I reaffirm our commitment to a future where young people are not only protected by mobility systems but are recognised as co-architects of their future.

Foreword Executive Director

Since 2009, YOURS has built the world's leading platform for youth-driven road safety action, placing road safety firmly on the global youth agenda and elevating young voices into the highest levels of decision-making. Over the years, we have trained 16,972 young people, coached 2,766 youth leaders to take on roles in the road safety and transport sector, and reached nearly 120,000 people through our investments. Our work has also influenced 17 governments, contributing to policy and legislative changes that strengthen road safety and advance more equitable, youth-centred mobility systems.

2025 was a decisive year for YOURS. We sharpened our focus on in-country action, prioritising localities with the highest burden of unsafe mobility. This strategic shift reflects our conviction that youth leadership must be rooted in the lived realities of communities most at risk, while remaining connected to the global movement for safer and more sustainable transport.

In parallel, YOURS reinforced its commitment to shifting power toward youth-led action and aligning more closely with the broader transport agenda. This ensures that our contributions support not only road safety but also the transition toward sustainable, climate-resilient, and inclusive mobility systems.

At the programme level, YOURS made meaningful progress by operationalising its glocal approach. This enabled us to tailor programmes and advocacy to local realities while drawing on global evidence, networks, and best practices. Our partnerships with local organisations deepened the relevance and quality of youth-driven initiatives, generating context-specific knowledge, adapting tools to cultural and linguistic

needs, and equipping young leaders to advocate with greater precision. These efforts elevated youth voices in policy conversations and strengthened attention to road safety and sustainable mobility at the local level.

A defining moment of the year was the 3rd World Youth Assembly for Road Safety in Morocco, which convened 150 youth delegates from nearly 50 countries. More than an event, it served as a temperature check for the field: a moment where youth stood before ministers and UN officials to demand accountability and accelerate progress. The resulting [Global Youth Statement](#) is now a living advocacy tool, reminding us that "Nothing About Youth Without Youth" must be a guiding principle for systemic change, not a slogan.

I am deeply proud of the global community of young leaders advancing road safety and sustainable mobility. Their work demonstrates the transformative impact of recognising youth not merely as beneficiaries, but as contributors and co-architects of mobility systems. As we look to 2026, I hope YOURS and its partners continue addressing this urgent power imbalance by providing young people with the structure, support, and global platforms they have long been denied, so they can keep driving progress toward safer, sustainable, clean, and equitable mobility for all.

How Change Happens at YOURS

Nothing About Youth Without Youth: From Vision to Systemic Change

YOURS - Youth for Road Safety works with and for young people to demand and deliver safer, more sustainable and more inclusive mobility systems. Its vision is a world where no young person loses their life on the road, and where youth are protected by mobility systems they also help to shape.

This vision responds to a fundamental imbalance. Young people are the most affected by unsafe mobility, yet remain absent from the rooms where transport

systems are designed, financed and governed. Closing that distance is not only a matter of inclusion alone, but also a condition for building systems that actually work for the people most at risk.

At the same time, mobility is undergoing a global transformation. As the world moves towards the last five years of the 2nd Decade of Action for Road Safety and the beginning of the Decade of Sustainable Transport, mobility solutions that are safe, sustainable, clean and equitable have become urgent. YOURS positions youth as essential contributors to this transition, shaping decisions today that will define tomorrow's mobility systems.

2025: A Glocal Year for Youth Power

2025 marked a transition year for YOURS as we sharpened our focus on the areas where our work can deliver the greatest impact. With the realities of operating as a medium-sized organisation, we made deliberate choices about where to invest our time, expertise, and partnerships to ensure that our contributions remained meaningful and sustainable.

In 2025, the glocal approach adopted by YOURS allowed us to prioritise and activate local and regional resources (people, programs, funds) as we saw shifts in global needs. This allows us to respond more quickly to regional calls and crises with context-appropriate solutions. Our glocal approach is firmly rooted in the needs and demands of youth, responding with a differentiated approach to the very different local realities they live in.

The 'glocal' approach relies on local partners and allies in each location we work in to customise solutions and share contextual evidence. YOURS endeavours to understand and factor in the local context to the greatest extent possible while operating as a global organisation, with respect and deference to what works in each environment. At the same time, we endeavour to draw creative connections across communities to share solutions, calling upon the shared humanity of youth leaders to identify cost-effective, evidence-based solutions that might work for various locales.

Through specific actions implemented in 2025, YOURS has committed to contributing to local and regional efforts in priority areas to:

- 1. Support tangible policy change**
- 2. Increase youth mobilisation in specific areas**
- 3. Localised knowledge in terms of context and language**
- 4. Influence local investment to increase road safety and sustainable mobility budgets connected to youth engagement.**

By embedding the glocal approach into our 2025 work, YOURS laid the foundation for a more responsive, equitable, and youth-driven way of operating; one that will continue to shape our impact in the years ahead.



What **Youth-Driven Change** Looked Like in 2025

Across YOURS advocacy, capacity development and youth mobilisation programmes, young people moved from participation to leadership, contributing to decisions, shaping agendas and driving action within their own contexts.

Advocacy

Influencing decision-makers on the need for road safety with youth leadership

In 2025, Advocacy efforts focused on connecting lived experiences with policy discussions, ensuring that young people are recognised not only as those most affected, but as essential contributors to solutions.

Across global platforms and country-level engagements, YOURS supported youth in bringing their visions and evidence-based solutions to the most renowned road safety and sustainable transport conferences at the global and national levels. Key moments included the 4th Global Ministerial Conference on Road Safety, the International Transport Forum Summit, and the Transforming Urban Mobility Initiative (TUMI) event.

This influence is reflected in the UN Decade of Sustainable Transport implementation plan, which explicitly recognises young people as key actors in shaping the future of mobility. As part of this global framework, YOURS is committed to strengthening youth leadership by expanding the Global Youth Coalition into the sustainable transport field, while also joining forces with the Global Alliance of NGOs for Road Safety to mobilise up to €3 million in support of youth- and community-led initiatives and evidence-based advocacy.





Capacity Development Informing and skilling leaders of today and tomorrow

In 2025, capacity development focused on enabling knowledge to move across regions and translate into action. Among the different training models and methodologies YOURS has specialised in, the Training of Trainers model played a central role this year, equipping the Global Youth Coalition for Road Safety’s regional leaders to deliver localised learning experiences to their peers, adapted to their contexts, languages and realities.

This approach reached 388 participants through 15 localised sessions across four regions, demonstrating how capacity can be scaled through peer-led learning. By overcoming barriers such as language and time zones, and delivering content in multiple languages, knowledge became more accessible, relevant and applicable across contexts.

The YOURS Academy, the YOURS global e-learning platform on road safety and sustainable mobility, supported this and other training programmes. In 2025, the Academy had reached 430 new learners across 37 countries, issuing 464 certificates.

Youth power and mobilisation Energising a global youth movement for road safety

In 2025, youth mobilisation transformed learning and advocacy into a connected, sustained global movement taking action.

The Global Youth Coalition for Road Safety grew to **3,000** members, with **557** new members joining in 2025 alone, reflecting both the reach and relevance of youth-led engagement. Beyond growth, the focus shifted towards strengthening how young people connect, collaborate and remain engaged over time.

Community connection, alumni involvement and local actions marked a key step in this direction. On the one hand, the [CoalitionHUB](#) enabled YOURS members to interact, exchange ideas, and participate in initiatives and conversations that interested them. On the other hand, the Alumni Network reactivated a group of **60** youth aged 32 or older and prepared them to become peer mentors to younger youth, starting in the field of road safety and sustainable transport.

Together, these initiatives provided the infrastructure for sustained participation, enabling members to access opportunities, exchange knowledge and continue contributing to policy change beyond individual moments of engagement.

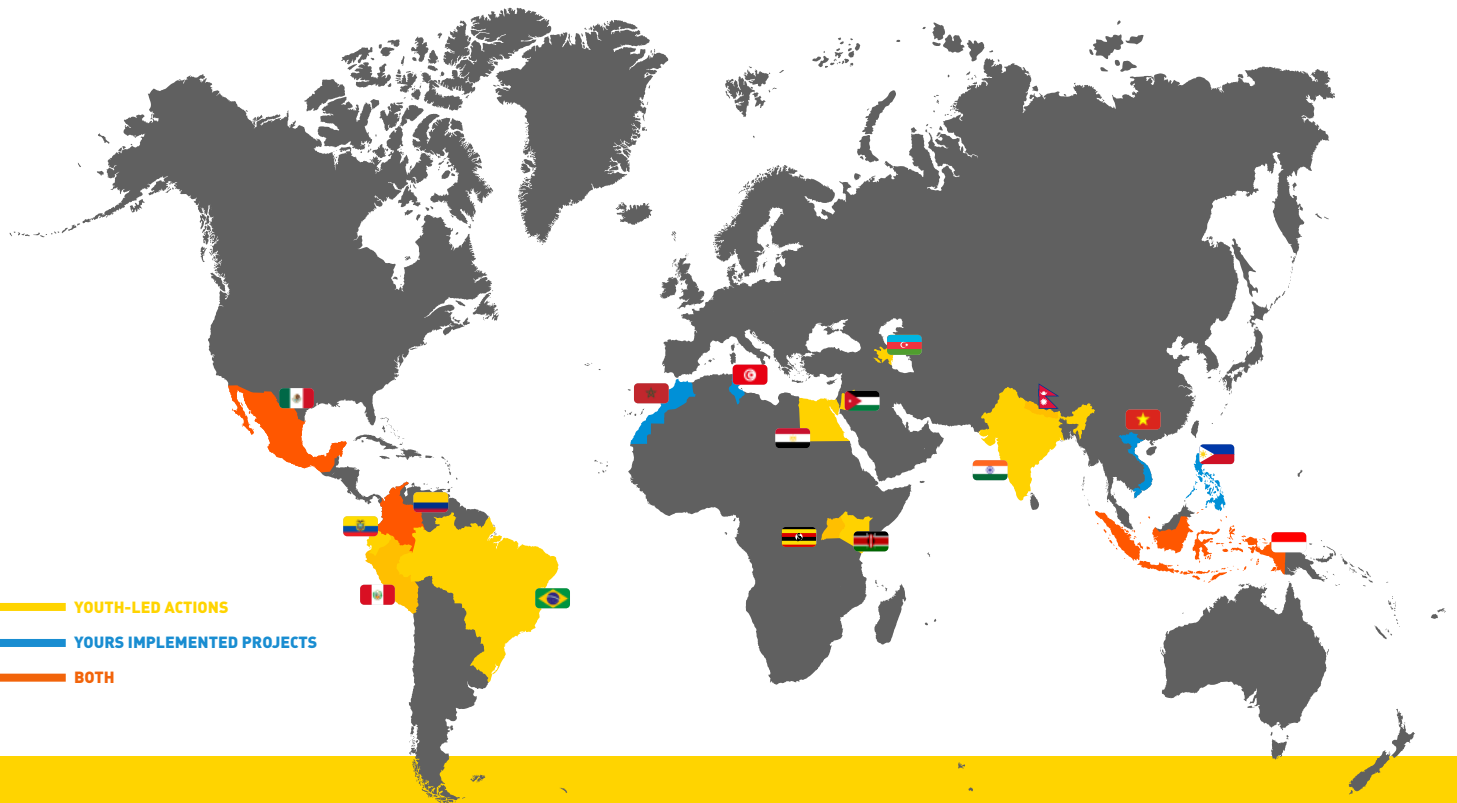

Glocal Change in Action: Country Spotlights



Vietnam Empowering Youth for Livable Cities

722 secondary school students consulted | 70 government authorities engaged | 4 cities

In many Vietnamese cities, young people walk and ride through streets that were never designed with their lives in mind. Empowering Youth for Livable Cities is changing that.

Delivered by AIP Foundation in partnership with YOURS, the International Road Assessment Programme (iRAP), Fondation Botnar and the FIA Foundation, and in collaboration with local authorities across Yen Bai, Pleiku, Vinh Long and Rach Gia, the programme strengthens youth well-being by equipping teachers to mentor a new generation of youth leaders through a cascade model. By combining digital tools with peer learning, young people are not only learning about road safety but also beginning to shape it in their own communities.

The programme started with listening. A needs assessment gathered insights from 93 school educators and 722 secondary school students, identifying the soft skills, technical knowledge and learning approaches that would matter most. Two YOURS Academy modules were translated and adapted to the Vietnamese context, and two bespoke curricula were designed, expert-reviewed and delivered through a Training-of-Facilitators model. Throughout the process, young people and educators helped shape the programme, rather than simply receiving it.

Mexico

Youth on Track

13 Motorcycle Safety Ambassadors | 3,150 people reached directly | 5.6M reached through media

More than 15,000 people die on the roads in Mexico each year, and young motorcyclists are among the most affected. In the State of Mexico, traffic crashes remain one of the leading causes of death among young people aged 15 to 29. Youth on Track (Jóvenes en Ruta) was created to change that reality from within, by placing young riders at the centre of motorcycle safety action.

Implemented by YOURS with local partner **Liga Peatonal**, and supported by the **Autoliv Safety Foundation** and the **Municipality of Toluca**, the programme enabled young people to take action for safer streets, focusing on helmet use and safer motorcycle riding behaviours. The initiative brought together an ecosystem of partners, including government institutions and technical organisations, to support youth-led change.

At its core were 21 Motorcycle Safety Ambassadors who completed a structured learning journey combining evidence-based content with case studies grounded in Mexican realities. Equipped with technical guidance, monitoring support and a small implementation budget, each Ambassador designed and led their own community intervention.

These activations reached **3,300 people directly**, promoting correct helmet use, safer riding behaviours and compliance with existing regulations. A coordinated media campaign amplified these efforts, reaching **5.6 million people** across five municipalities.



Colombia, Tunisia, Indonesia, Mexico

Youth Advocates to Rethink Mobility

16 youth advocates | 4 countries | 20 coaching sessions

Young people often see the gaps in their cities first, and are heard last. The Youth Advocates programme was designed to close that distance, equipping sixteen young leaders across Tunisia, Colombia, Mexico and Indonesia with the coaching, knowledge and institutional access needed to influence policy change.

Implemented by YOURS with the support of the **FIA Foundation**, the programme was delivered in partnership with local partners in each city: Despacio in Bogota, Colombia, **Liga Peatonal** in Guadalajara, Mexico, **ASR (Association de la Sécurité Routière)** in Tunis, Tunisia, and **Kemi Ketiga** in Bandung, Indonesia, ensuring that each intervention was grounded in local realities while connected to a global movement.

Over the course of the year, advocates participated in 20 coaching sessions, including group and city-level formats, strengthening their advocacy strategies and deepening their technical understanding of safe

and sustainable mobility. An in-person session in Tunisia, held during the **MENA Regional Conference on Adolescents' Health and Well-being**, connected participants with global practitioners and expanded their networks.

Across the cohort, advocates led local campaigns and community actions using approaches such as tactical urbanism, street art and participatory design to reimagine their streets. In Tunisia, this translated into the development of an action plan on speed management and safer school zones, created in collaboration with **ASR** and formally endorsed by the **Tunisian Road Safety Committee**.

With the programme continuing into 2026, these early results are laying the groundwork for deeper engagement between young advocates and decision-makers, as their ideas begin to shape how safer and more sustainable cities are planned.



Western Visayas, Philippines

LinK4All: YOURS Academy Goes Glocal

24 government officials trained

In 2025, the Philippines became the first country to integrate the YOURS Academy into a formal government action planning process. Through the LinK4All project, 50 young professionals from government, academia, civil society and the private sector were trained in Safe System principles and engaged as contributors to regional road safety planning.

This collaboration led to two key outcomes: the draft **Western Visayas Road Safety Action Plan 2026–2028** and a subnational planning manual designed for replication. LinK4All shows how global learning can translate into local systems change when young people are equipped and trusted to shape policy from the start.



Multi-country

Local Actions seed funding programme

15 projects | 14 countries | 47,250 people reached directly |
262,000 people reached indirectly | 32 public entities engaged

Young people are experts of their own realities and have the potential to contribute to road safety and sustainable mobility, but are rarely empowered to participate meaningfully. The Local Actions programme invests in youth-led grassroots projects that respond to urgent road safety and sustainable mobility challenges. In 2025, 15 projects across fourteen countries focused on three strategic priorities: **sustainable, inclusive and active mobility (SIAM); motorcycle safety; and speed reduction.**

Funded by **TotalEnergies Foundation** and supported by partners across every stage of the process, from selection to on-the-ground implementation, the programme provides seed funding, technical support and mentorship for one year. In 2025, over **110 young people** joined implementation teams, while project leaders received more than **40 hours** of expert guidance to strengthen their initiatives.

An important innovation in 2025 was the introduction of a **two-week Residency Programme** at the start of implementation, equipping project leaders with practical skills in project management, advocacy, community mobilisation, communications, and monitoring and evaluation. Together, these youth-led initiatives reached **over 47,250 people** directly and more than **262,000 indirectly**, demonstrating how locally driven, evidence-based approaches can translate into tangible improvements in how people move through their cities.



Success Story

Pedalea Seguro



Led by Jeffrey Leandro Díaz
Lima, Peru

PEDALEA SEGURO, launched by Red Convivencia Vial and Conservamos por Naturaleza SPDA, aimed to redesign Lima's urban landscape by making cycling a safe, efficient, and popular mode of transportation. The project addressed two major issues: a low cycling rate as a primary transport mode (only 4.6% in 2023) and inadequate cycling infrastructure: insecure and non-interconnected bike lanes.

After reaching over 22,000 people in Lima and delivering a Cycling Infrastructure Dashboard of Lima supported by the local government, Pedalea Seguro was ready to scale. What started as a seed-funded Local Action has grown into a multi-city initiative, securing 100,000 USD in global funding and expanding across Lima, Tacna and Trujillo.

Key policy changes implemented by PEDALEA SEGURO include:



Enhancing Cycling Infrastructure

Advocating for an increase in safe and segregated bike lanes, applying the normative of the "Public Spaces Law" and its regulation.



Public Awareness and Education

Conduct media campaigns to promote cycling's benefits and to improve road safety awareness.



Partnerships for Funding and Support

Collaborating with local governments and cooperation organisations to secure funding for infrastructure improvements.



Data-Driven Development

Using traffic and accident data to guide infrastructure development and urban planning.

Mapping and creating dashboards of cycling and pedestrian infrastructure.

During 2025-2026, **Pedalea Seguro 2.0** will implement four main lines of action:

Analysis of urban policies and regulations.

Legal and technical support for cycling groups to ensure their sustainability.

The goal is to build a replicable model of open data and an active community that benefits thousands of people and promotes healthier, more humane neighbourhoods. This is a testament to how youth-led ideas can scale, attract investment and begin to shape safer mobility systems.

3rd World Youth Assembly for Road Safety

Every five years, the World Youth Assembly for Road Safety brings the global youth movement face-to-face with the decision-makers shaping the future of safe and sustainable mobility. In February 2025, Marrakech became that meeting point. Held as an official side event to the 4th Global Ministerial Conference on Road Safety, the 3rd World Youth Assembly brought together 150 youth delegates from 49 countries alongside partners, ministers and UN officials, under one shared principle: Nothing About Youth Without Youth.

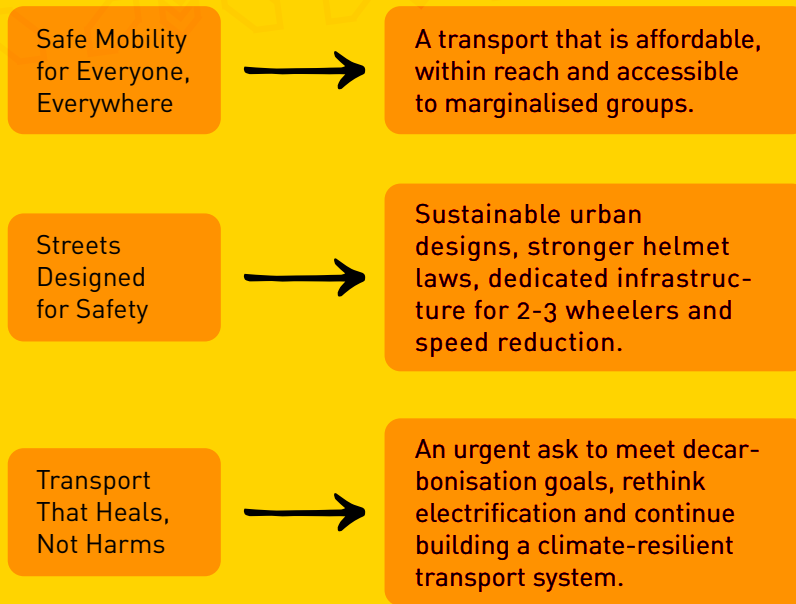
Organised by YOURS in partnership with the World Health Organization (WHO) and Morocco's National Road Safety Agency (NARSA), the Assembly was made possible by FIA Foundation and TotalEnergies Foundation, with support from Abertis, Uber and Bloomberg Philanthropies. A taskforce of seven Global Youth Mobility Ambassadors led the design and delivery of the two-day programme, combining interactive learning, cultural expression and direct policy engagement, with creativity and innovation at the centre of the road safety message.



At its centre was the 2025 Global Youth Statement for Road Safety, shaped for over 18 months by more than 800 young voices from 130+ countries. The Statement was formally endorsed by 14 national delegations at the Ministerial and now continues as a sustained advocacy tool, driven by three core demands: doubling investment in youth-oriented, safe, and sustainable mobility; strengthening multi-sectoral and intergenerational collaboration; and establishing effective accountability mechanisms.

On the other hand, the two-day agenda included hands-on capacity development parallel sessions, implemented with the support of experts in topics related to road safety, such as gender, active mobility, health, education, multi-modal transport, climate action, infrastructure, motorcycle safety, domestic financing, technology, and others. These partners brought their expertise to the selected topics, and YOURS offered its award-winning capacity development methodology.

YOURS also took part in the 4th Ministerial Conference on Road Safety, where its representatives participated in a panel and the closing ceremony to carry the message from the wider youth community:

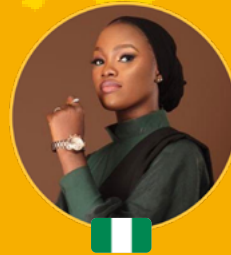

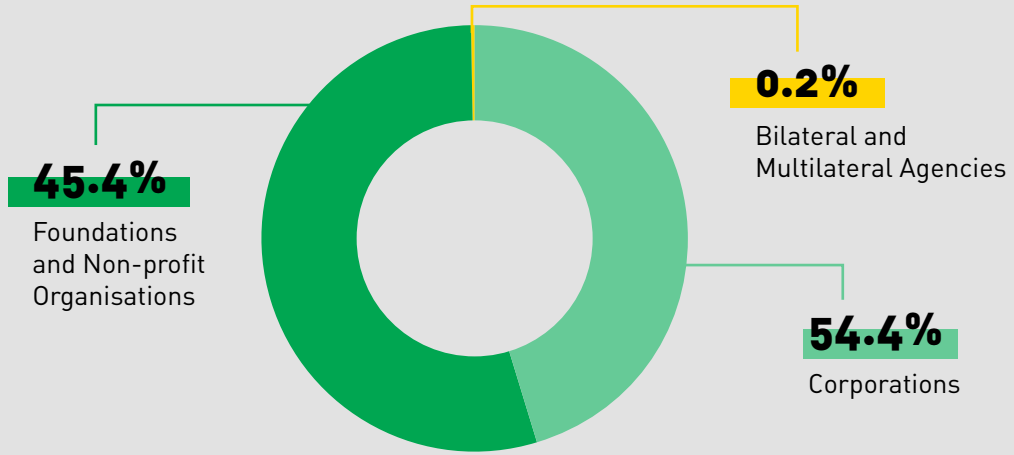

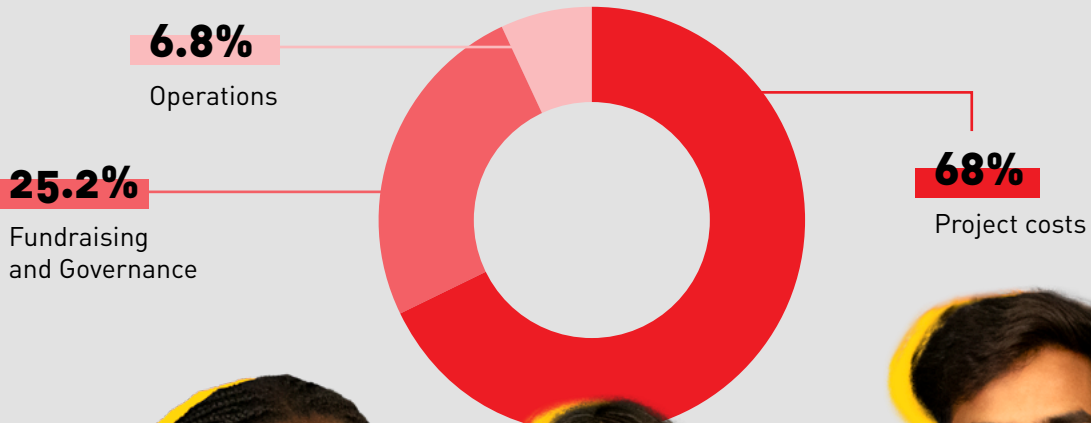

What Comes Next:

What does 2026 look like?

As YOURS enters 2026, we step into a decisive year for global mobility. The Decade of Sustainable Transport offers a powerful opportunity to mobilise investment for community-level and youth-led engagement in transport decision-making. In the year ahead, YOURS will continue working to ensure that young people are not only consulted but actively shaping the policies, systems, and investments that determine their mobility futures.

2026 also marks the beginning of the final five years of the Second Decade of Action for Road Safety. With an official UN High-Level Meeting on Improving Road Safety on the global agenda, YOURS will continue elevating road safety as a critical priority for achieving the Sustainable Development Goals. We will support youth leaders to bring evidence, lived experience, and bold ideas into these global conversations, reinforcing that protecting young lives is essential to sustainable development.

Partnerships will remain central to our strategy. YOURS will deepen collaboration with technical road safety organisations whose evidence-based solutions address the most urgent challenges facing young people. Their expertise will continue to inspire and strengthen the youth leaders we support. At the same time, we will expand alliances within the sustainable transport community to reinforce YOURS' position as the only global youth movement united around safe and sustainable mobility. These partnerships will help amplify youth voices, accelerate innovation, and build stronger ecosystems for change.

In 2026, YOURS will also advance key programmatic priorities. We will integrate emerging technologies, including the responsible use of artificial intelligence, to enhance youth engagement, improve data-driven advocacy, and strengthen programme delivery. Our motorcycle safety agenda will expand, with targeted work on licensing, helmet quality and affordability, and speed management. Through these efforts, we aim to support youth advocates in advancing local policy discussions and strengthening legislative frameworks that protect young road users.

The launch of the YOURS 2026–2030 Strategy will anchor all these efforts. This renewed organisational outlook reaffirms three strategic principles that will guide our mission over the next five years: **that true sustainability cannot be achieved without embedding safety at every level of mobility decision-making; that influencing investment and financing is essential to unlocking the scale of change required for safer mobility systems; and that nothing about youth should be decided without youth meaningfully engaged, empowered, and represented in every stage of decision-making.**

Together, these priorities set the stage for a transformative year. In 2026, YOURS will continue to drive global momentum, strengthen youth leadership, and shape the future of safe and sustainable mobility for generations to come.
